#### **What is City Harvest?**

City Harvest pioneered food rescue in 1982

This year, we will collect 59 million pounds of excess food from farms, grocers, restaurants, and manufacturers

We distribute it free of charge to 500 community food programs across NYC's 5 boroughs

We help feed the nearly 1.3 million New Yorkers struggling to put meals on their tables


Innovations in programming and operations



Focuses on community-based solutions, network-building, and tackling hunger and its root causes with local community leaders











5 core members lead committees: youth outreach, green action, civic engagement/arts, outreach and expression

Current work: events and community campaigns

Future work: long-standing advocacy and organizing campaigns (i.e. food co-ops in Public Housing)




#### **Big Wins**





- NYCHA crawl on the day of the Climate March
- 4 Public housing developments hosted 15 different food justice groups
- Linked the issues of sustainability to food access








Washington Heights/ Inwood: Catarina Rivera

Completing first year

#### **Key Takeaways: Big Challenges**

Building up new community group from scratch

Representing the unique demographics and culture of each community

Housing and gentrification = dominant neighborhood issues

Transient, non-cohesive communities

Food access often a peripheral issue for residents





#### **Key Takeaways: Tips for Your Work**

Schedule open-ended meetings to talk to people

Follow up, follow through

Ask people to lead

Accept diverse viewpoints and see their value

Food insecurity is not always top of mind for those who are affected by it

Be flexible and find relevant collaboration spaces

#### From Boroughs to Tiers...

#### **Past**

- Work with emergency food programs divided by borough
- Managed relationships as dictated by geography, logistics, compliance and pounds targets
- Capacity building addressed as discovered through compliance building.

#### **Present**

- 4-Tier Model dividing our programs by capacity.
- Ability to address and link programs based on need and growth potential, as well as internal targets and development strategies.
- Strategic Management



### **Pantry Forward**

 Pantry Forward- focused initiative to assist 10pantries that distribute over10 million pounds annually across NYC

 Pantries have been identified as programs on the verge of being stable, successful non-profit entities
